Fisheries Report

How many times have you heard this.....
 “There’s good news and there’s bad news.”

Here we are after another promising summer was spoiled by one too many heavy rains over the upper Guadalupe Basin.

That last heavy rain on Memorial Day weekend sent big flows down into the lake which mixed with the last bit of cold water in the lake making the lake temperatures a homogeneous 70 degrees. Those releases slowly increased in temperature throughout the summer to where we are now seeing releases from the dam around 74 degrees.

I was surprised that our Trout held on as long as they did. As late as the middle of August John DeLoach reported seeing many Trout come up in the morning for his daily feedings. In my most recent call to him (9/6/16) he reported seeing no Trout coming to the pellets he cast upon the water. I have a feeling that warm temperatures of the releases have again left very few Trout in the river for our upcoming season. Marcos Dejesus will be on the river this fall to look for any holdover population. As that information becomes available I will pass it along. It seems a few Trout make it every year and maybe this year, some of them are Browns.



Now the good news. I have contacted the hatcheries we use and we are ready to go; 12,000lbs of Rainbows in 3 stockings and 1,000lbs of Browns in one additional stocking. You should experience the same good fishing as we had last year. I am still

working on Lease Access sites. I am looking to increase access this season, more on that soon. We will have to watch the temperatures of the releases to determine when we can schedule our first stocking. I will send out an e-mail blast to our members announcing all this information and any changes as we get into this coming fall.



Flows are still above average and the lake still above pool as of September 9 2016. I have checked NOAA’s long range forecasts. They are predicting El Nino neutral conditions through fall and winter with normal to slightly below normal precipitation over Texas for the same period. Normal rains should return in the spring. Thus we should expect, higher flows at first with normal flows of 100-150cfs most of the coming winter. Maybe next summer we will see cold sustaining flows and good fishing. Only time will tell.



So there you have it, we are on the verge of another season of Texas Trout fishing. Plenty of big Rainbows and with mean ole’ Browns

again prowling our river. The Lease Access Program will be open on GRTU's website around October 1st for the coming season. I will be one of the first ones to get my LAP passes. Last year we sold out. So get your membership early and don't be like some of those who missed out last year.

Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing and Reel Recovery are partnering to offer increased therapeutic angling opportunities for male veterans in the cancer recovery process by introducing them to the healing properties of nature and the sport of fly fishing.

Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing (PHWFF), a nonprofit that supports disabled active military and veterans through fly fishing, is working closely with another non-profit, Reel Recovery, to give veterans in the cancer recovery process the opportunity to enjoy the healing properties of nature and fly fishing. The Reel Recovery program employs fly fishing in a safe, supportive environment for participants

to explore their personal experiences of cancer with others who share their stories to improve the lives of the men they serve. It is through these parallel activities and peer support that PHWFF veteran participants and cancer survivors

will have new opportunities to heal.

"We're thrilled to be partnering with PHWFF to expand Reel Recovery's Retreat Program to male veterans living with cancer. While we've had many veterans attend our retreats over the past 13 years, we are honored to now have this opportunity to serve these courageous men as a group." - Stan Golub, Executive Director - Reel Recovery

This new partnership provides an outstanding new venue for PHWFF participants in the cancer recovery process to continue on their journey of healing and recovery, while becoming involved with another like-minded community and organization.

Male veterans living with cancer will take part in the joint retreat in Texas on November 1-3, 2016 at Camp Capers in Waring, TX. The Retreat is offered at no-cost to the participants and will be led by professional facilitators and expert fly-fishing instructors

The mission of Reel Recovery is to help men in the cancer recovery process by introducing them to the healing powers of the sport of fly-fishing, while providing a safe, supportive environment to explore their personal experiences of cancer with others who share their stories. Our purpose is to address the growing demand for and limited supply of support services specifically tailored for men with cancer. Our overarching goal is to improve the lives of the men we serve. We seek to give these courageous men a respite from their day-to-day concerns so that they might gain a fresh outlook on their fight with cancer; we facilitate discussions that give them strength, encouragement and a new network of friends and support; we provide cancer information and resources to enable better management of their




Letter from the Editor:

This change in venue will also allow the vendors to set up in the Exposition Tent day(s) earlier than in the past and thus have time to enjoy the banquet and some fishing on the river. 

NOTICE OF PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES

The officers and board of directors of GRTU identified several areas of our bylaws that need to be updated. A bylaws committee was appointed by GRTU president Joe Filer in the April board meeting to undertake a review of the bylaws and propose recommendations for changes to the board. The board has reviewed these proposed changes and recommends that the updates be presented to the chapter membership as noted, by a consensus vote of the GRTU board of directors, by President Joe Filer. A vote for approval will be conducted during the October general meeting.

The proposed changes include:

- . Removal of the ex-officio position (the immediate past president filled this role, which was intended to be a mentoring position - the board finds this unnecessary and recommends removal)
- . Clarifications on terms, election criteria, and responsibilities for the National Leadership Council Representative to better align with TU national guidelines
- . Creation of a State Council Chair position, with terms, election criteria, and responsibilities (historically the chapter president has served this role, but we believe this is in conflict with the current bylaws which disallow serving in 2 officer roles at the same time)
- . Clarifying nominations committee verbiage for officer and director elections
- . Clarifying who may submit their name for consideration for an open director seat or office.

This Land is Your Land

Over the next 30 days, TU will be feeding you a heavy dose of public lands. From the Golden Trout wilderness in California to the Green mountains of Vermont, public lands are hugely important to wild and native fish. In most western states, public lands comprise more than 70 percent of the available habitat for trout, and virtually all of the strongholds for native trout.



My father is the sixth generation of our family to grow up in Newark NJ. Growing up, the closest public land we had was a local county park called Tuers, where I shot countless hours of hoop. Except for visiting family in Ireland, I didn't leave the Garden State until college in Vermont, and there discovered the Green Mountain National Forest. I spent many hours in that forest catching native brook trout.

After graduation I took a long, slow trip across the country with my dog, Gus, and a big box filled with Dinty Moore beef stew. Gus and I walked the Natchez Trace in Mississippi. We hiked the Smokies in Tennessee. We took pictures of fields of Black Eyed Susans in the Shenandoah. Swam in hot springs in Idaho and clamored over red rocks in Utah. Camped among the aspen in Colorado. Hiked old growth forests in Oregon, marveled at the coastal redwoods of California.

All those places share one thing. They are public lands that belong to us all. For now. In recent years, more than 50 short-sighted bills have been introduced in state legislatures to transfer, sell, or otherwise take away your birthright—the public lands that are managed for us by the U.S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management. Not to be outdone, Congress has entertained similar proposals. Presidential candidates have campaigned on the issue. As much as we'd all like to think “that can't happen,” the fact is that there are well-heeled special interests dedicated to seeing that it does.

Those who seek this so called “transfer” -- county supremacists, sagebrush rebels, and their contemporary cicadian progeny -- neglect an important fact. At no time did the Western federally managed public lands belong to the states. They were either ceded to the Union by eastern states or acquired through treaty, conquest or purchase by the federal government acting on behalf of the citizens of the United States.

Public lands are the best idea America ever had. For those of us who want to fish and hunt, camp and hike without having to beg or buy permission, they are a godsend. The ham-handed dialogue about transferring or divesting public lands that drives the debate today is unhelpful and unproductive. To suggest that our land legacy—a legacy that a kid from New Jersey shares with a rancher in New Mexico—should be transferred or sold for a pittance is extreme and offensive.

For the next 30 days, tune into TU for a steady diet of why public lands matter. Share the stories, video, and photos with your friends. Let your member of Congress and elected leaders in your state know that the public lands are a birthright that belongs to all of us, and we are not willing sellers.

Thorax: SLF Dave Whitlock dubbing


Directions to the Canyon Lake CRRC Recreation Center

>From NORTH or SOUTH: Just North of New Braunfels on I-35 take Exit 191, (Canyon Lake Exit), which is FM 306 and go WEST, about 14 miles to Sattler (Canyon Lake area). Go past the traffic light at FM 2673 in Sattler for about 2 miles, (through Canyon City) and turn Left at the stop light and small road sign marking the South Access Rd. Follow the South Access Road for about two miles, passing below the dam and across the spillway. The Recreation Center will be on your left.

>From the WEST: From US 281, turn EAST on FM 306, which is between Twin Sisters and Spring Branch. Drive about 16 miles to the stop light (just before you enter the area called Canyon City). Turn Right on South Access and follow the South Access Road for about two miles, passing below the dam and across the spillway. The Recreation Center will be on your left.

>From the EAST: From I-10, take SH 46 to I-35. Go North on I-35 to Exit 191 (Canyon Lake Exit), which is FM-306. Go west, (Left), on FM306, about 14 miles to Sattler (Canyon Lake area). Go past the traffic light at FM 2673 in Sattler for about 2 miles, (through Canyon City) and turn Left at the stop light and small road sign marking the South Access Rd. Follow the South Access Road for about two miles, passing below the dam and across the spillway. The Recreation Center will be on your left.
